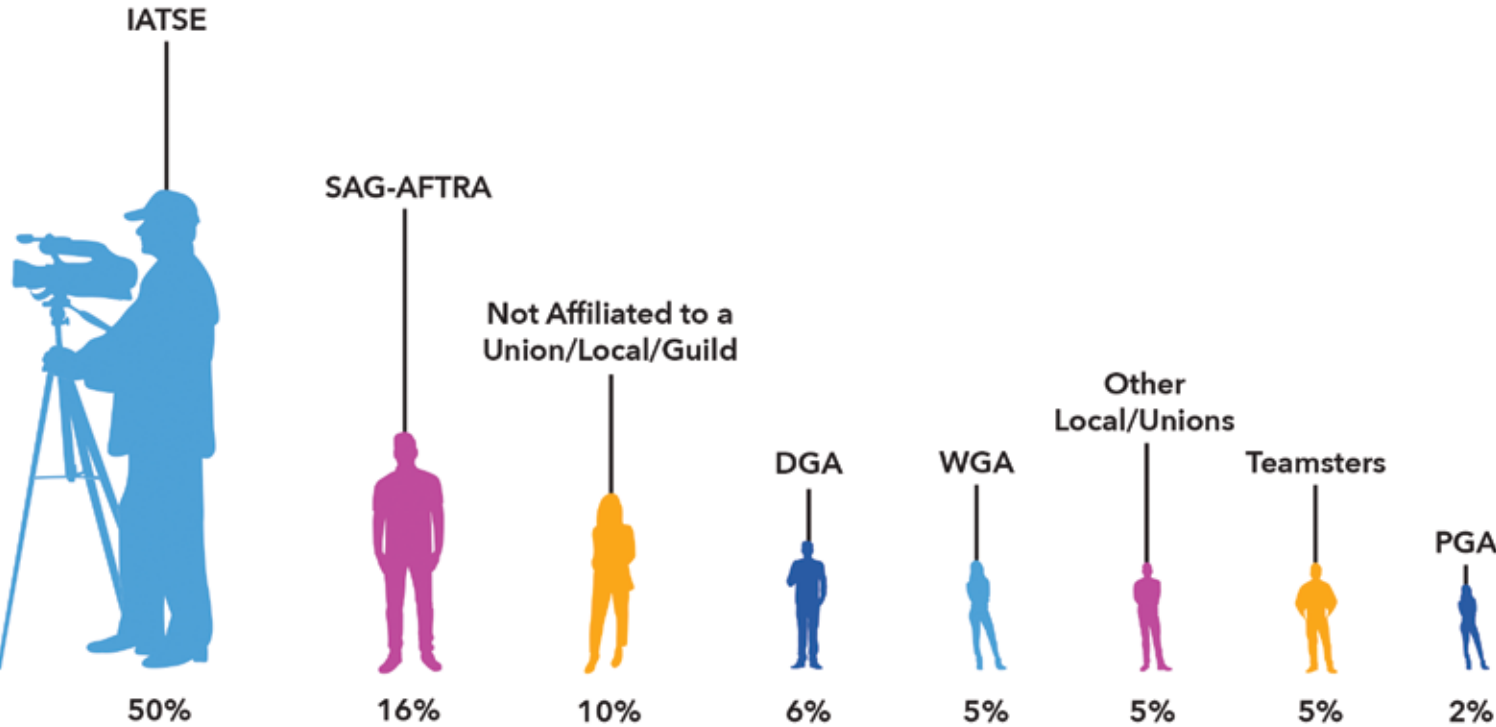

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On January 7th, the Southern California wildfires changed the lives of many in our entertainment community forever. Over 16,000 structures, including the homes of working and retired industry members and their families, were destroyed. **Jennifer Jorge**, LCSW, Director of MPTF Community Social Services, reports that that our social workers had to pivot quickly in response to this crisis: “Unlike the pandemic or strikes, this was a sudden natural disaster that left people shell-shocked. We had to go out in the community on a grassroots level.”

The MPTF social work team mobilized immediately, urgently reaching out to high-risk community clients in fire-impacted areas while fielding hundreds of calls from working and retired industry members in crisis. Requests for help centered on critical basic needs—safe shelter, food, water, and clothing—as the devastation proved catastrophic. In the days that followed, urgent needs evolved into recovery—securing replacement documents and navigating complex FEMA and insurance systems.

Industry-wide crises always require attention to each individual and their families’ needs, but as Jennifer explains, the aftermath of the wildfires required a long-term model of recovery that’s still very much going on a year later. First, people had to get the essentials they needed like food, a roof over their head, and essential documents. The process of providing financial assistance and rebuilding, including regular monthly check-ins, is still ongoing. MPTF was also responsible for disbursing wildfire relief funds contributed by generous individual and corporate donors and many guilds for members who had been displaced and needed assistance right away. In all, in 2025 MPTF provided \$7.2 million in financial assistance to members of our entertainment community.

The combination of L.A. wildfire financial assistance and ongoing monthly support from MPTF Social Workers has been life-changing for individuals affected by the devastation. Beyond meeting immediate financial needs, this support has provided stability, emotional reassurance, and a pathway toward recovery during an incredibly difficult time.

Jamie Gomez, a longtime SAG-AFTRA member supported by MPTF Social Worker **Juan Olivia**, LMFT, said: “It is hard to put into words how much it has meant to us during what has been an incredibly long and difficult journey. Your help has not only been meaningful in the immediate aftermath but also in the months that have followed, when so many other forms of assistance have naturally ended. That ongoing support has made a real difference for us as we try to find our footing and define what our ‘new normal’ will look like... With rental inventory so limited and prices having increased since the fire, the process has been a challenge as we strive to stay fairly close to our children’s schools. Through it all, your support has helped ease some of the pressure as we continue to manage increased expenses and uncertainty.”

Zelda Lambrecht, longtime member of Local 892 & 705 supported by **Lorna Kahn**, MSW, told us: “I never imagined last year would unfold the way it did. I never imagined I’d find myself starting over (again), unsure of what ‘home’ will look like anymore. But in the middle of all that uncertainty, I found a ‘sign’ in my ashes. Your love & support has held me together; you are my ‘safety pin.’ Your generosity and kindness have meant more than words can ever express. Thank you for lifting me up, reminding me I’m not alone, and for giving me the strength to envision my road toward home. With all my heart, thank you.”



Our social workers’ outreach to the community included a significant presence at resource fairs to inform union members about the numerous services we provide in times of need. A Teamsters Local 399 Hollywood swap meet in February brought together the guilds to give each other a helping hand, followed by an IATSE Local 80 household items giveaway. The Laugh Factory in Chicago even held a fundraiser benefiting MPTF, and a Movie Awards Charity Challenge was held for the Night Before with entrants contributing donations to wildfire relief recipients. Coverage included appearances on KTLA and at the Vanity Fair Oscar® Party with Courteney Bailey and Matt Bomer spreading the word about how MPTF is here for those who need us.

The holidays near the year’s end brought an opportunity to connect and heal with two special Community Dinners in November and December at Local 80, with resilient industry members and their families joined by members of our social services team and senior management to enjoy meals provided by Bruce’s Catering.

Alleen Ramrus, a beloved MPTF resident, artist, and teacher profiled in our 2023 annual report, created a powerful painting depicting firefighters heroically at work during the wildfires. The painting was presented at Station 69 in Pacific Palisades to Captain II Tommy “Kit” Kitahata and the firefighting team; sadly we lost Alleen in 2026, and her painting at the firehouse (seen also on the cover of this report) is a testimonial to the impact of her work that will never fade.

Jacqueline Craven and her now-deceased husband, acclaimed film editor and Local 700 and DGA member Garth Craven, had already been through the 1993 Malibu fires and built up a life in Hollywood (including work on numerous Sam Peckinpah films) including their beloved home. When Garth passed away suddenly in 2023, Jacqueline began Elder Connection services through MPTF, providing direct support and referrals to community resources and services for seniors. Jacqueline was evacuated multiple times from facilities after her home was severely damaged in the wildfires, and our staff quickly transferred her to campus for an assisted stay at the Lodge and permanent residence at a cottage, “a sanctuary to soothe the soul,” she tells everyone.

One Palisades resident who had to find shelter urgently was **Adam Lorenzo**, a veteran comedy writer and filmmaker who worked on *Saturday Night Live* and *Everybody Loves Raymond*. “I was talking to an emergency service when I had to get out within 48 hours,” he says. “They said if I had nowhere to live, MPTF might have a place open.” MPTF welcomed him to the campus where he lived in a Cottage for almost five months and made some great friends. There, he regrouped on a film project he was working on, a high-concept romantic comedy called *The Break-Up Pill*. Now the directorial debut of **Tom Arnold**, the film even shot scenes here on the MPTF campus, including the John Ford Chapel and the Louis B. Mayer Memorial Theater. “The nicest people, the nicest community,” he said of his time here. “I get emotional when I think about it.”

“The wildfire devastation is unlike anything Los Angeles has ever faced, and we must act urgently to help people in immediate need.” That’s how **Jeffrey Katzenberg** described the pressing need to help friends and colleagues who needed comfort and resources, prompting him and his wife, **Marilyn Katzenberg**, to step up with a \$5 million donation to take action for an industry blindsided and in desperate need of help. Their example was one of many from the industry taking the lead to make a difference including a \$1 million donation from **Tom Hanks & Rita Wilson** and major donations from **Netflix** and **First Entertainment Credit Union**.

Throughout the year, MPTF held webinars for numerous aspects of wildfire relief including tenant rights, the Eaton fire lawsuit, and FEMA assistance, as well as general next steps for anyone affected. Guest speakers appeared to give guidance on how to navigate insurance claims, taxes, and much more.

SUDDEN TURNS

In 2024, the life of Local 700 Editors Guild member **Glenn Darby** was suddenly thrown into upheaval with the passing of Heidi, his wife of thirty years. Glenn had been living in L.A. since 1988, first getting into the entertainment industry by joining what is now SAG-AFTRA. He moved into editing in 1997, the same year his daughter was born, and that family bond was something he and his wife sustained every day.

"Working in this industry is a struggle," Glenn says, "whether you lose someone or jobs come and go. I'm ashamed to ask for help because I don't feel like I deserve it. I lost several family members during Covid, and then the shock just suddenly hit me." Through Local 700, Glenn found out about MPTF and its range of social services providing help when times get tough. **Naomi Rodda**, MSW, LCSW, MPTF's Director of Home & Community Based Services, assessed Glenn's situation upon meeting with him and advised him to go on disability right away. She also directed him to grants and workshops available through other entertainment community-based organizations.

Jenny Lam, MSW from our Social Services team, has been doing regular check-ins with Glenn and helping him keep up with necessities like bills and rent. That team is working every day to provide counseling services to industry workers around mental and physical health, whether it's managing stress, dealing with work-life balance, or coping with a debilitating loss like Glenn. Our social workers offer confidential help and can work with individual circumstances and needs. There's no reason to be afraid or ashamed to ask for help; those under 65 can call our intake line at 323 634 3888, or for those 65 or over, call 323 634 3866.

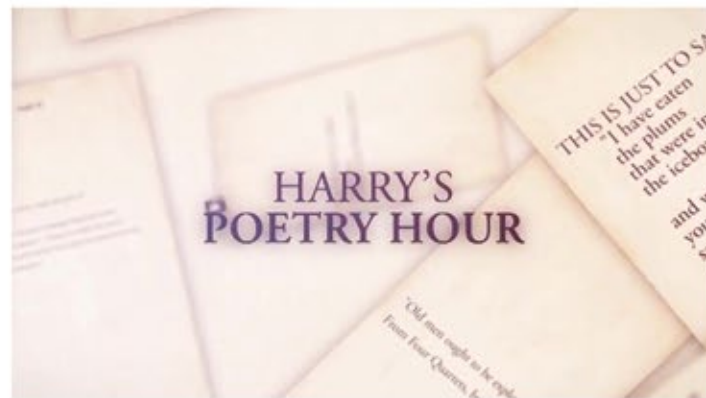
"You don't know all they can do until you need help, and that's how we survive," Glenn says. "It's how we continue to go on and be a part of the arts community." Glenn has reignited his love of acting and rejoined SAG-AFTRA while enjoying his other passions like music. As he puts it, "This industry is certainty and uncertainty at the same time. The next job might not come right away. In this day and age, it's easier to pivot when you can't rely on a steady job or income. I can't retire; there's so much more life to live. I know I love what I'm doing."

MPTF is ready to step in when challenging events are facing you, your family, or the entire industry at large, whether it's strikes, city-wide emergencies, or sweeping employment losses. Our social services team is here for you as an individual - a reminder that life can be turned upside down without warning at any day. For working and retired workers and their families, reaching out can make all the difference when you feel there's nowhere to turn.

THIS IS THE LIFE

After leading careers in the creative arts for much of their working lives, MPTF residents refuse to allow their creativity to end in retirement. That's why they and our staff have created new ways to stay engaged and express themselves. That includes the long-running Creative Chaos programming live from MPTF Studios which began during the pandemic.

One of the original shows, *Harry's Poetry Hour*, hosted by actor and renowned poet **Harry Northup**, far surpassed the 200-episode mark in 2025 and amassed an astonishing roster of guests from across the globe. Harry expresses his extreme gratitude to the MPTF Studios team for fostering the show, saying that "just to have a poetry show at MPTF is amazing-- not just the high excellency of the poets out there but also the actors who read on the show including MPTF residents. I went to my first poetry reading in 1966 at St. Mark's Church on the Bowery in Manhattan and to hundreds after that, and I'm a student of film, acting, and poetry. One thing I like about MPTF is it's like having a patron who takes such good care of us here. I'm the curator but all of us on the show are the creators, celebrating the individual voice. The reason poetry has continued to endure is because it tells the truth." A makeup artist since 1976 (among other pursuits including being a dancer and university professor), **Robert Ryan** moved onto the MPTF campus in April. "When I got here, I was the new kid on the block," he says. "I started dreaming up this idea of a Harvest Ball with a live band, where we could invite literally everybody on campus." Working with our Recreation & Activities and Hospitality departments, he turned the Country House's dining room into a New York supper club. Volunteer Elena Arroy from Local 706 even brought in volunteer members to "glam" the residents for a night out without actually leaving home. "Seeing the people show up, especially the ones from Long Term Care and Harry's Haven, really did it for me," Robert says. He was so moved, energized, and inspired that he followed up the Harvest ball with a New Year's Eve Ball, complete with watching the ball drop live from New York and expanding the space into the Country House lounge.

In November, our campus memoir-writing group, The Grey Quill Society, came together for the first time in front of a live audience at the Susan and Gary Martin Screening Room here on campus to read a greatest hits collection of their favorite stories -- ranging from the heartfelt to the hilarious. "It was special to share a bit of our Grey Quill magic," says MPTF volunteer, supporter, and filmmaker **Victoria Bullock** who runs their gatherings and oversees their published book series. It was a big day, following a wonderful front-page story on The Grey Quill Society in the *Los Angeles Times* earlier in the year, and as Victoria says, "People are constantly interested in visiting the Grey Quill gatherings-- but we're not set up for guests; we barely have the space anymore for our writers (a great problem to have!), and more importantly, our sessions are deeply personal and vulnerable, which changes with an audience. A Grey Quill live session felt like the perfect solution! And I'm so, so glad it was well received... We will definitely be doing more readings in the future!"

A TIME FOR ANGELS

Often thought of as end-of-life care, palliative care is actually specialized care for anyone living with a serious illness alongside curative treatments to manage pain, symptoms, and emotional stress. MPTF's palliative care has been a national leader since 2005, and many local and national programs are built on our model. The **MPTF Palliative Care** team includes the four pillars of care (physical, psychological, social, and spiritual)-- a palliative-care certified physician and nurse practitioner, plus team members typically not paid for by traditional insurances such as a social worker, nurse, chaplain, and coordinator.

One industry worker helped by the MPTF Palliative Care team in 2025, a 38-year-old SAG-AFTRA member with stage one breast cancer, was referred to us by a union friend. Not being able to work during treatment scared her, as did changes in her appearance; she also had a history of body and emotional trauma making it difficult to trust her providers. The team provided support through medical education, processing feelings about the surgery, and cognitive behavioral strategies to help ground her. Our nurse provided regular check-ins to make sure her symptoms and comfort were well managed. When she developed neuropathy and lymphedema that made it difficult to function, our MD provided symptom management to help, and the team helped pay for caregiving and problem-solved ways to get additional support with shopping and laundry. She has since left the program and feels confident the team would be there for her if her medical situation changed.

The team also worked with an industry family whose parents are dealing with progressive dementia for the husband and cancer treatments for the wife, a still-working actress. Their social worker assisted with community resources and provided guidance about planning for potential placement for the husband, while their nurse offered education on disease changes and disease management. UCLA palliative-care certified physician **Dr. Daniel Karlin** helped with symptom management for the wife through early stages of chemotherapy, and spoke with her about advance care planning as her husband's needs changed.

For over two decades, **Susan Bay Nimoy** has generously supported the program with the creation of the Leonard Nimoy Palliative Care Chaplain, a position held by **Rabbi Arthur Rosenberg, CPC**, and in 2025 her support of the program and this position increased. During the holidays, volunteers from the Palliative Angels program, together with generous donors including the National League of Young Men West Valley, and the Rabbi's Fund, ensure that families living through a serious illness can experience the joy of the season without the added emotional and financial burden of providing holiday gifts. By thoughtfully selecting and wrapping presents, the Palliative Angels program lifts a tremendous weight from parents' shoulders. Said one of the families, "Financially, we wouldn't be able to provide Christmas for our children, which is painful. But even more so, the gifts you brought are a morale boost. It feels like people care about us and that we are not alone." The team is grateful to the industry insurances including DGA-Producers, MPI, SAG-AFTRA, and PWGA for recognizing that serious illness treatment isn't just about treating the physical aspects of disease. THE GIFT OF TIME

"I didn't know anything about working with long-term residents and was just observing. The residents, the people who run the Activity Room, and volunteers like Mary McCoy were having so much fun interacting that I stopped feeling self-conscious and jumped in, taking their lead, doing what they were doing. It became like a spiritual experience." That's how **Michael Warren**, a former basketball star for the national champion UCLA Bruins and an actor in TV series, including *Hill Street Blues*, felt when he came by MPTF to check out volunteer opportunities. That visit led to him becoming a regular volunteer with long-term care residents at our Mary Pickford House.

That's also where you'll find **Robin Weiner**, a 7-time Emmy®-nominated producer of several successful Nickelodeon shows like *iCarly* and *Victorious*. She first heard about MPTF through a colleague, and "after I was told MPTF's assistance was accessible to anyone working in the industry, I immediately made a donation. Looking for volunteer opportunities, I remembered MPTF." Here she works with the Activities Department in Mary Pickford House and Harry's Haven, MPTF's memory care unit. "One resident I visited used to play the piano and loved classical music," she says, "so I made a music playlist for his iPad. Another loves to snack and has a stash in his room, so I'll make him an ice cream float and a snack plate he can nibble on after lunch." Especially meaningful were a book of life reflections and photos she created for a resident and his family, and a filmed staged reading of a poem by another resident, Sam, produced with MPTF Studios.

As for the MPTF Activities staff, "They never fail to inspire me to do better. Amazingly, the staff know every resident's backstory and individual quirks. They've fostered a true sense of community and family among themselves and the residents." Though Robin was initially intimidated a bit by the idea of volunteering in long-term care, she says, "As it turns out, I have a lot in common with my residents. We have endless conversations about our shared industry experience and just about anything and everything else that I talk to my other friends about. So just do it!"

"Don't be intimidated because people might be in various mental or physical stages," Michael adds. "Their spirit is really incredible. Having been on some of the greatest Coach Wooden teams, I went from that to the entertainment industry and realized it's just another team. The craft services guy is just as important as the star of the show, and a volunteer is just as important as the people working 9-5." As our Director of Engagement **Fredda Johnson** puts it, "Our volunteers may have been on different sets and soundstages, but today they share something even more enduring by giving back to the people who helped build the industry they love."

STRONG LEADERSHIP

Our Board of Directors and Board of Governors feature a wide range of enthusiastic supporters committed to seeing our mission thrive for the industry's current and future generations. In October, we expanded our Board of Governors, nearly doubling it with strong new additions, including actors **Ike Barinholtz**, **Yvette Nicole Brown**, and **Colin Farrell**, producer and entrepreneur **Christine Chiu**, ID PR founder **Kelly Bush Novak**, CAA managing director and motion picture agent **Maha Dakhil**, former L'Oreal USA group president **Carol Hamilton**, filmmaker **McG**, managing partner of business services firm NKSFB **Mickey Segal**, and Amazon MGM Studios' Head of Film, Streaming and Theatrical **Courtenay Valenti**. Shortly after the announcement, Barinholtz appeared to spread the word about MPTF on the *Daily Variety* podcast, saying, "I don't know what that says about my personality, but I have no qualms standing on a stage with a microphone and pointing to someone and guilting them into giving us a couple extra bucks!"

Two longtime key supporters of MPTF whose contributions cannot be overstated were elected as the new Co-Chairs of our Board of Directors: **Emma Thomas**, who won the Best Picture Oscar® for *Oppenheimer* along with her husband and fellow MPTF board member **Christopher Nolan**, and industry veteran and film producer **Kevin McCormick**. They took over from current Board member **Jim Gianopulos**, who had served as the Board chair for 9 years. "It's been a real honor for me to lead the board of MPTF for nine years," Jim said, "and I feel it's time to hand the baton over. There couldn't be two more thoughtful, passionate, and enthusiastic supporters of MPTF than Emma and Kevin."

Thomas, a board member since 2018, and McCormick, part of the MPTF family for 35 years and a founding producer of our Reel Stories, Real Lives fundraiser, have been working together as co-chairs of the Social Services Governing Body, our financial assistance committee.

"Since 1921, MPTF has been a lifeline for our industry's workers when they have fallen on hard times," Emma said. "I have been lucky enough to witness the work of its incredible staff first hand, whether that be in offering funding to tide families over during crises, providing a home for film and TV industry professionals who have reached the end of their working lives, or help with accessing benefits due from state or federal agencies."

"For years, I had thought MPTF was nothing more than the Country House for retirees," Kevin said of his initial discovery of what we do. "And then Roddy [McDowell] introduced me to the expanding campus and the entire menu of support that MPTF offers – from childcare to geriatric care, with financial assistance, social services, case management, and wellness opportunities in between. Thanks to him, I can't imagine being part of this industry without being part of MPTF."

A BEAUTIFUL BOND

“We are deeply indebted and grateful to the film and television industry for what everyone does to make the world a more beautiful place. It is a real symbol of our much deeper partnership. It’s a partnership we want to continue forever.” That’s how **Carol Hamilton** described the mission of **L’Oréal USA** to support MPTF when we spoke to her six years ago. At the time she was Group President, Acquisition. In May 2025, she officially retired from L’Oreal as U.S. President of Acquisitions after a remarkable 40-year career, including the establishment of L’Oréal USA’s signature corporate office in El Segundo. A tireless philanthropist, Carol became a member of MPTF’s Board of Governors in October. Over the 21 years that L’Oreal has been a supporter of MPTF’s Night Before event, Carol has nurtured and embraced the company’s dedication to our mission of taking care of our own.
